I'm Not Just a Scribble . . .

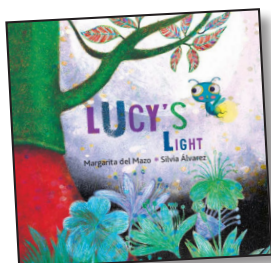

Have you ever smiled and said yes when you really wanted to say no? This is a fun story about the importance of communication and being assertive.



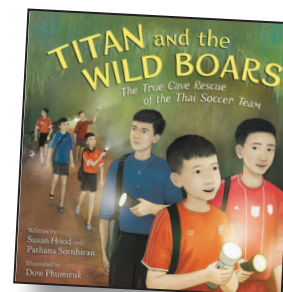
INTERMEDIATE (GRADES 3 – 5)

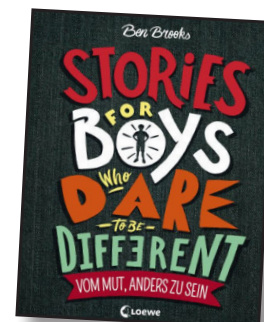
Time and oxygen were running out. The world watched as rescuers from around the globe worked to free the boys. After eighteen harrowing days, they were finally saved.

Boys can be anything they want to be! This book expands the gender-role conversation



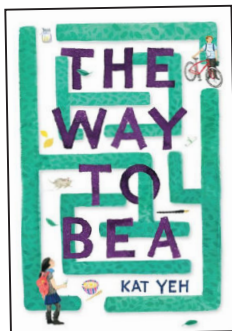

Claudia and Monday have always been inseparable—more sisters than friends. So when Monday misses the first day of school, Claudia's worried.



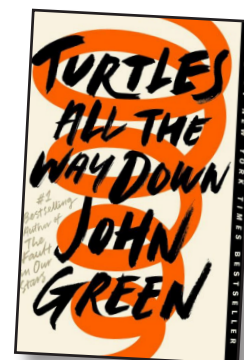
